Enjoy the October holidays, and all too soon the final term for 2023 will be underway.



PARKING RESTRICTIONS AT SCHOOLS ARE FOR THE SAFETY OF YOUR CHILDREN

Local Councils impose a variety of parking restrictions at and near schools to achieve a safer environment for your children. These restrictions are also to optimise traffic movement and safety.

NO STOPPING ZONES -

These zones are usually adjacent to school entrances and the approach and departure sides of school crossings.





NO PARKING ZONES -

You may stop in a No Parking zone to immediately pick up or set down your child, and drive off as soon as possible. No Parking zones are to ensure



a quick and smooth turnover of vehicles. You must not leave your vehicle par

You must not leave your vehicle parked or unattended. If you are going to collect your child from this zone, have your child wait nearby in the school grounds so they can see you arrive. On your arrival they can then leave the school ground, enter your vehicle and you can then drive off.

CONTINUOUS WHITE CENTRE LINE -

If a road has a continuous white centre line, there must be 3 metres between the vehicle and the white line.

SCHOOL CROSSINGS -

You cannot stop within 20m of the approach side or 10m of the departure side of a school crossing.

SPEED LIMITS -

Speeding vehicles in a school zone are highly dangerous for children. There is a speed limit of 25 kph, designated by the signs and a zigzag line below, any time when children are present or when the lights are flashing (depending on the type of crossing).








INTERSECTION OR T-INTERSECTION

(Restricted Area)

You cannot park within 10m of the intersection.



CROSSING PLACES (driveways)

You may park so that the front of your vehicle is level with the approach or the back is level with the departure side of a driveway to any private or public property so that vehicles can enter and depart safely.

FOOTPATHS / NATURE STRIPS -

Parking is prohibited at all times. It creates dangerous situations for both pedestrians and other vehicles in the vicinity.

DOUBLE PARKING -

Creates dangerous situations anytime, however the danger is increased near schools, especially when children are entering or leaving school.

Senior School News

ith just four weeks of regular lessons officially left for our Year 12 students, the pointy end of the year is upon us.

Many students are starting to feel the strain of impending final deadlines and the thought of exams. As parents, your support of your child's education is vital to their success as they finish out this year. Please encourage your children to communicate with their teachers, and ensure that they attend every lesson so that they gain the full value of their best resource for revision and final assignments – their teachers.

There are a few key events that will still be happening this year, Year 12 students will have their final day on Friday 27th October, with the Stage 2 Exams beginning on Monday November 6 (the exam timetable follows on the next page). All students are expected to attend the final week of formal lessons, they will have a fun week of dress-ups with a theme each day, culminating in a fun afternoon on the oval on Thursday 26th October. On Friday 27th October, students are invited to a breakfast supplied by the UAHS Governing Council beginning at 8am. Following the breakfast they will have their final Whole School Assembly in the gym and bid farewell to UAHS, leaving at recess. Week 3 is known as SWOTVAC (study week) and students are welcome to come into the Senior School Centre to study, however they must sign in on arrival and out as they are leaving.

During the October School Holiday Break, several Year 12 teachers are offering Holiday Study Sessions for their classes. This is an excellent opportunity for students to ensure they are on track with their exam revision or with completing assignments. Following, is the table of dates and times for these sessions. There are also outside agencies which offer holiday study sessions such as the Adelaide Tuition Centre https://adelaidetuition.com.au/ and Adelaide University https://www.adelaide.edu.au/study/year-12-tuition-courses, however these come at a cost. I have some brochures for the Tuition Centre in my office which students can collect at any time.

Another key date that is approaching is the SATAC application submission date for the \$60 fee on 29th September – after this date the application fee rises to \$210.

The Presentation and Graduation night will occur on December 1, more information about this will be sent out as we get closer. The Year 12 students will receive their final school report from the SACE Board once all the exams and final results are calculated.

As the Year 12s come to the end of their time at Urrbrae, we hope that they will leave us with many positive memories, and we wish them every success in their future endeavours.

The Agricultural Learning Centre

his year was the second for The Learning Centre managed by Urrbrae
Agricultural High School, with Agriculture Teacher, Larissa Tallent, coordinating the activities, sponsorship and significant student and staff involvement.

Always a family favourite, The Learning Centre is an interactive and informative exhibit where young people and their parents or carers can have fun and learn about agriculture in a safe and supervised environment. Over 200,000 thousand visitors enjoyed a range of daily handson activities and demonstrations that invited young and the not so young to learn all things Agricultural, with a soft approach to discovering where our food comes from and an introduction to the paddock to plate concept.





Alpaca Competition

rrbrae entered five alpacas and 23 student handlers in the show ring. An amazing job was done by all involved. Alpaca entries achieved 2nd, 3rd and 4th Places and student handlers achieved two 1st, three 2nd, two 3rd and two 4th Places. Urrbrae was the winner of Best Overall School. Congratulations to our student place getters.





Dairy Heifer Competition

rrbrae entered eight dairy heifers with a very successful result including: Newlyn Park Dylan Lyndal: 1st Schools Only Heifer Yearling, 4th - Junior Youth Show Heifer. Braelee Buttercup 113th: 4th - Illawarra Heifer January born 2023 and 5th - Schools Only Heifer January born 2023. Robsvue Askn Noelene: 3rd - Schools Only Heifer yearling. Empire TS Star Trooper: 6th - 15 to 21 Years Heifer 2 years, dry. Robsvue Dylan Piper: 5th - 14 years and under Heifer, 18 months.

Urrbrae also had a very successful Show with all our handler entries this year. Also, an amazing effort in the State Judging this with a 2nd in the State Junior Judging, and a 3rd in the State Senior Judging. Students were also lucky enough to represent many other studs in the show ring this week in all breed competitions. Throughout the show we had Urrbrae students in almost every class.









rrbrae achieved some significant results in the Led Wether Goat Competition. 25 Urrbrae students from Years 8 to 12 were a part of the show team with 11 goats entered (9 of our Urrbrae bred Boer wethers and 2 Saanen wethers).

The Junior Judging Competition resulted in two 1st, four 2nd and four 3rd Place ribbons. The star goat "Apollo" was 1st Place Heavy Weight Champion and overall Grand Champion for the whole competition, which had 250 goats and over 300 handlers from schools across South Australia. The Urrbrae team also achieved 2nd Place for the Most Professional Show Team which is evidence of their hard work and dedication, both at the show and in preparing for the show.

UAHS was also the 3rd Most Successful School in the Junior Cookery Competition and 5th Most Successful Cookery Exhibitor in all Secondary School Classes.










SA Wool Judging Competition

Haymaking at Urrbrae

Spring is in the air, the days are getting longer, and Urrbrae's hay crops are ready for cutting! By the time this article goes to print, Urrbrae's hay crops will be cut and probably baled.

Urrbrae has some older hay making equipment, however without a mower-conditioner we are unable to split the stem nodes to help dry out the crop faster – ready for baling (sponsorship welcome). Therefore, the school relies on a run of fine spring weather to naturally dry out the hay before it is baled.

This year Urrbrae has sown two paddocks of barley hay to a new variety called Harpoon. Harpoon is a new forage barley (Moby barley type) that has wide adaptation and good grazing recovery. It is a competitive, vigorously growing crop and is used in paddock rotations to reduce weeds in paddocks. One hay paddock was grazed in winter and has since recovered well.

All up the Urrbrae farm has 2.3 Ha of hay, sown by Urrbrae farm staff and students. Hay crops also provide a valuable teaching tool for students to help them learn the different growth stages of cereals.

Brenton Borchardt's class has set up an experiment with different treatments applied to enable students to take dry matter cuts.

It has been a terrific season at Urrbrae, and we look forward to seeing the hay yield in the next few weeks.




The highly detailed work demonstrates students' engagement and the cross curricular connections that were made.
